## Philip Tahourdin Killed in Action

Mrs Helen Hawkins of Glebe Croft has received the sad news that her son, Philip Ramsey Tahourdin was killed on 18<sup>th</sup> April in the campaign in Mesopotamia. He was a Lieutenant in the 47<sup>th</sup> Sikhs and part of the contingent to relieve the surrounded garrison at Kut, which is 100 miles south of Baghdad.

Philip was appointed to the Manchester Regiment after completing officer training at Sandhurst and had been promoted to Quartermaster before proceeding to the front with the 47<sup>th</sup> Sikhs. He had only been made a Lieutenant 4 days before he was killed trying to take fresh ammunition to the front.

In the letter received by Mrs Hawkins, his Colonel spoke on how well Phillip was liked including by the Indian ranks and he was certain that if he had not been killed, he would have been the next company Adjutant. The regiment has lost heavily through his death.
